Getting Here

Biddulph is part of the Staffordshire Moorlands district in the north west corner of Staffordshire, with Stoke-on-Trent to the south. The A527 is adjacent to the town and provides access to Congleton in the north and Newcastle-under-Lyme and Junction 16 of the M6 to the south via the A500. It's within easy reach of the renowned Peak District National Park.

Parking

Sainsburys (Wharf Road ST8 6AJ) offer free parking for 3 hours for their customers. Staffordshire Moorlands District Council manage a fee-paying car park on Wharf Road (ST8 6AG). There are 137 spaces, open from 8am to 6pm. Parking is free for disabled badge holders.

By Bus

D&G Bus provides bus services to Hanley (No 9) and the Biddulph Circular (No 93). The No 94 goes north to Congleton and south to Newcastleunder-Lyme and Tunstall. Tel 01782 332337 www.dgbus.co.uk First Potteries also provides a bus service (No 7A) to Hanley. Tel 0345 646 0707 www.firstbus.co.uk. Bus timetables are available in the Town Hall.

By Train

There is no rail service to Biddulph, the nearest stations are at Congleton, Kidsgrove and Stoke.

By Taxi

There is a taxi rank in the High Street, outside the Town Hall.

Public Toilets

Free public toilets are available within the Bus Hub by Sainsburys.

93 Bus Service : Buses between Biddulph Moor and Pennine Way via Knypersley – Biddulph - Gillow Heath -Woodhouse Lane

Funding a bus service is not usual activity for a Town Council, but Biddulph Town Councillors were so concerned by the proposal to end the 93 bus service in 2017 that, following a County Council consultation and online petition, in 2018, Biddulph Town Council stepped in to offer financial support.

Councillors feel very strongly that a bus that serves the community of Biddulph is a fundamental public service. In areas such as Gillow Heath and Biddulph Moor, many residents are unable to access important services such as GPs, dentists and shops. There is also no safe walking route into town.

The 93 bus also connects residents of the town with wider areas and enables them to access family members living outside the area, work, college and hospitals.

From Monday 22 November 2021, the 93 bus service route changed to incorporate the Aldi store, making it easier for shoppers to use the store and still travel into the town centre. Paper versions of the bus timetable are available from the Town Hall.

Buses on service 93 do not operate on Saturdays, Sundays or Bank Holidays.

Biddulph – A Brief History

The district of Biddulph was created in 1894 and is made up of seven small settlements – Biddulph, Gillow Heath, Knypersley, Biddulph Moor, Bradley Green, Brown Lees and Biddulph Park.

The local MP and industrialist Robert Heath was responsible for the greatest changes in the life and appearance of the valley. Before the

industrial revolution arrived here, there were around 200 houses and the people were generally involved in occupations connected with farming. The development of the pits and iron works (in 1857) created a huge labour market and therefore, a vast house building



programme. Terraced houses for the workers and larger, grander homes for the bosses were built, together with schools, churches and pubs. Shops were opened in Bradley Green – where the High Street is now. Links between Stoke-On-Trent and the canal system in Cheshire were developed in order to bring in raw materials and carry away goods produced here. A new toll road was made to run through Biddulph to Congleton and the Biddulph Valley Railway was opened in 1858. When the new urban district of Biddulph was created, the villages and hamlets of the Biddulph Valley were brought together under their one name – Biddulph, the town being first marked on Ordnance Survey maps in 1930.

Biddulph - Today

Biddulph is a friendly town with approximately 20,000 residents. There are numerous shops and businesses in and around the High Street, including restaurants, cafes and pubs, hair salons, barbers, fish and chip shops, estate agents, a florist, gift shops, beauty salons, a post office, takeaways, a butcher's shop, pharmacies and national supermarket chains.

There are a good range of facilities including bus services, doctors, dental surgeries, a library, a bank, leisure centre, parks and countryside walks, schools and many groups, sports clubs and social organisations for both young and old.

Open country and moors are accessible by road within five minutes from any given point in Biddulph, and the town has become known as 'The Garden Town of Staffordshire'.

From Spring right through to late Autumn, Biddulph is awash with colour. Flower beds, troughs and baskets line the streets with thousands of painstakingly chosen plants, all of which are nurtured locally, and maintained by the volunteer resident's group Biddulph in Bloom, which greatly contributes towards the colourful setting of this pretty town.

Biddulph has a rich calendar of community events for both residents and visitors. The town has so much to be proud of and Biddulph Town Council is passionate about working in partnership with the community to keep it welcoming to all.

Biddulph Heritage

Biddulph can boast a heritage dating back to the Doomsday Book. Here's just a taster of our local history:

Biddulph Old Hall

Built as a family mansion by Francis Biddulph in the 1580s in local stone. In the Civil War it was attacked by cannon fire, the largest hole made by a cannon known as Roaring Meg. It's now a private home.



Biddulph Grange

In 1842 James Bateman developed the Grange into a notable country home and garden. James Bateman left the Grange in 1869 and the house and gardens were bought by Robert Heath in 1872. In 1921 Robert's son gave the house and estate for use as a hospital and it continued as such until 1991. The garden was acquired by the National Trust in 1988 and opened to the public in 1991 after three years of restoration work.

St Lawrence's Church

A church was situated on this site in 1190 AD. During the siege of Biddulph Old Hall, during the Civil War, the parish church suffered extensive damage. The church was largely rebuilt in 1833.

The Bridestones

Built by settlers, around 2,500 BC, the Vikings called this ancient burial site 'Breitha' or 'Broadstones'. We now call this place 'Bridestones' - large, stone uprights can be seen today.

Shepherd's Cross

It's believed the stone cross dates back to the 14th Century. It's about 1.2m high and has a cross-shaped head and incisions on the front. It was probably used as a meeting or marketplace in the Middle Ages. It may also have been a gathering place for worshippers.

Coal Mining



First recorded in the Biddulph Valley in the early 17th century. Robert Heath came to the valley in 1857 and created the Biddulph Valley Coal and Iron Works. The coal mine, named Victoria, provided the main source of employment in the area. The iron works closed in 1928 and the colliery in 1982.

Biddulph Moor Well Dressing

The blessing of wells and water supplies dates back to the Celts or even earlier. Wells are dressed with pictures made of natural products, such as flower petals, mosses, beans, seeds and cones, pressed into clay. Biddulph Moor celebrates Trent Head Well (a source of the River Trent) annually in June with a main dressing on the Village Green Well at the junction of Woodhouse Lane and New Street and other smaller dressings on Chapel Green, at the side of Hot Lane near the Methodist Church.

The White House

A cruck-framed sixteenth century grade II listed cottage off Akesmore Lane in Gillow Heath retains its thatched roof, outer walls of wattle and daub and painted brick infill and original



ground plan with opposing entrances. The house is a private home.

Biddulph Town Council

The Town Council is based within the Town Hall and is responsible for the management of the Town Hall, Biddulph Grange Visitor Centre, the 'Bus Hub', burial grounds, allotments, tourism, community events, grant assistance to local groups, etc.. Although the smallest of the councils operating in the town, it has a varied workload, impacting the lives of those living in the town. Biddulph Town Mayor

Biddulph's Town Mayor and Deputy Mayor are elected annually by Councillors at the Annual Meeting of the Town Council in May. Each Mayor presides over meetings of the Town Council and serves as an ambassadorial and ceremonial figurehead for the Council in the community, attending engagements and officiating at events. The Town Mayor raises funds for their chosen charities by hosting community fundraising events and an annual Civic Ball.

Biddulph Town Crier

The role of Town Crier in England goes back to Medieval times when town criers were the means of communication, as many people could not read or write. These days the Town Crier makes public announcements about

local events, using a handbell to attract attention and shouting 'Oyez, Oyez, Oyez' which means 'hear ye' – a call for silence and attention.



Biddulph Town Council manages the Town's Burial Ground at the rear of St Lawrence's churchyard, north of the town centre on the A527 and Woodhouse Burial Ground, off Woodhouse Lane (at the rear of the bowling club on Congleton Road).

The Council is also responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the closed churchyard (no further interments in new plots are permitted) of St Lawrence's Parish Church. The Council takes pride in maintaining it to a high standard and creating an atmosphere of peace and calm.

Biddulph Allotments

Biddulph Town Council owns an allotment site at Park Lane and leases a site on Moorland Road. There are just under 40 allotment plots. The larger of the two sites being Park Lane, with 15 sites at Moorland Road. Facilities are installed on site to allow allotment tenant's access to water.



All plots are currently occupied, but a waiting list is maintained. If you'd like to add your name to the waiting list you need to fill in an application form, obtainable online via the Council's website, or from the Town Hall. Allotment holders are not allowed to keep livestock, but a small shed is permitted with permission. Twin Town

Fusignano

Since 1987 Biddulph has been twinned with Fusignano, a small town in north east Italy, close to the Adriatic coast.



Aims of Twinning:

- To promote social, educational, cultural and sporting links with the people of Fusignano.
- To develop strong ties which will lead to a better understanding of the people of other countries.
- To institute regular exchanges between individuals and groups of all ages from the two towns.

History of the Twinning

Biddulph Town Council first discussed the possibility of twinning the two towns in 1987. In August the same year, the Mayor of Biddulph at the time, the late Councillor Eddie Sutton signed a Twinning Charter with the Mayor of Fusignano at that time, Signor Oriano Pirazzini, to maintain permanent bonds between the two towns.

Many lasting ties and friendships have been created through town twinning. Hopefully, exchange visits can resume post COVID-19 and we can welcome visitors from Fusignano to Biddulph again.

Community Events

Many events take place in Biddulph throughout the year. Here's a taster:

Market & Fresh Food Friday

Biddulph has held a market in the town, in various formats, for many years. Our neighbouring town of Congleton is a Charter Market, a status which was granted in 1272. This prevents Biddulph from having a market on a Saturday. Therefore, Biddulph's market is on a Friday. Traders line the central part of the town outside the Town Hall, to complement the High Street offering. From April 2022, a 'Twilight Market' will be tried. Biddulph Festival – June/July

Annual community festival, which began in 1997, held over 6 weeks from the end of June and throughout July. Supported by residents, local businesses, schools and organisations. Events usually include a launch day parade, dancing, concert, BBQ, 'Family Fun Day' and 'Biddulph by the Sea' with donkeys, sand, fair rides and ice cream.

Classic Vehicle Show – September Now an annual event, over 100 vehicles joined Biddulph's first classic vehicle show in September 2019. Plans had to be postponed in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions, with a welcome return in September 2021.



Remembrance – November

A town centre event, in partnership with the Royal British Legion commemorates those who served in all wars. A procession through town and a Service, wreath-laying ceremony and two minutes silence at the Cenotaph is followed by a service at Biddulph Methodist Church.

After a year where we couldn't commemorate the fallen together, it was lovely for our community to come together at our Remembrance Day Parade 2021.





Christmas Market & Lights Switch On in Biddulph & Biddulph Moor

Festive street market with stalls selling crafts and gifts, cakes, wreaths and street food. Fair rides, dancing, and carols on the Town Hall steps before the Mayor is joined by our Town Crier, Santa and special guests to light up Biddulph and the following week, Biddulph Moor.

Blue Badges – Parking Concessions for Disabled People

Blue badges are for drivers, passengers or children with severe mobility problems and for those who are registered blind. The scheme allows badge holders to park close to their destination but applies only to onstreet parking. They usually last up to 3 years and you must reapply before your current badge expires.

Apply or renew a Blue Badge via the Government's website: https://www.gov.uk/apply-blue-badge

You can get a blue badge if you:

- receive the higher rate of the mobility component of the DLA.
- receive a PIP because you can't walk more than 50 metres (a score of 8 points or more under the 'moving around' activity of the mobility component).
- are registered blind (severely sight impaired).
- are terminally ill and have a DS1500.
- receive the War Pensioners' Mobility Supplement.
- have received a lump sum benefit within tariff levels 1-8 of the Armed Forces & Reserve Forces (Compensation) Scheme and have been certified as having a permanent and substantial disability which causes inability to walk or very considerable difficulty in walking.
- receive the mobility component of PIP and have obtained 10 points specifically for descriptor E under the 'planning & following journeys' activity, on the grounds that you are unable to undertake any journey because it would cause you overwhelming psychological distress.

What you'll need:

- a photo or scan of your proof of identity (passport, birth or marriage certificate, driving license).
- a photo or scan of your proof of address (dated within the last 12 months a council tax or utility bill or government letter).
 If you're not automatically entitled as well as the documents above, you'll also need :
- a photo or scan of your proof of benefits (if you get any).
- a photo or scan of any documents related to your condition, if you have them (such as diagnosis letters or hospital correspondence).

You'll also need:

- your National Insurance number (if you have one).
- your contact details (phone number and email address).
- a recent digital photo of your face and shoulders .
- your existing blue badge details (if you are re-applying).
- ability to pay £10 by debit or credit card for the blue badge.

You'll need to provide further details if you:

- use any mobility aids.
- take any medication for your condition.

Blue badge holders

Renewal applications take approximately 4 weeks to process and new applications may take up to 8 weeks.

If you experience difficulties uploading your documents you can email blue.badges@staffordshire.gov.uk or call their Customer Service team on 0300 111 8000 and they can talk you through alternative ways of getting your documents to them. For questions about the blue badge scheme contact Staffordshire County Council.



Staffordshire's older or disabled residents can get free 24/7 bus travel in the Staffordshire County Council area (excluding the City of Stoke on Trent). The bus pass also allows for free travel in the rest of England between 9.30am and 11pm Monday to Friday and all day on Saturdays, Sundays and Bank Holidays.

All bus passes are issued by **Staffordshire County Council**.

You can apply, renew an expiring pass or replace a lost (£10 cost) or stolen pass online at <u>https://staffordshire.smartcitizen.net/public</u>

To apply you'll need:

- a valid email address (with their approval, this can be a friends or family members email address).
- a digital camera or an existing digital image.
- a scanned or digital copy of proof of identity (passport or driving license with photograph).
- a scanned or digital copy of proof of residency in Staffordshire (a utilities bill less than 3 months old, a bank or building society statement, benefit statement, pension statement, council tax bill, etc..)
- a scanned or digital copy of proof of your disability if you're applying for a disabled pass.
- your old bus pass if you need a renewal.



You can also renew passes or replace a lost or stolen pass by phoning the County Council's contact centre on **0300 111 8000**.

Biddulph Town Council Grants Schemes

Council grants enable organisations, voluntary groups and individuals access to funding to support projects, activities, educational experiences, new opportunities and innovations which benefit Biddulph residents.

The Council's current priorities for funding are:

- Young people (aged 13-19)
- Carers
- People at risk of loneliness and isolation
- Opportunities providing educational experiences
- Provision to improve social welfare and community cohesion

Applications are welcome for grants between £30 and £2,000. They may be submitted at any time, those received by May are considered for grant allocation in June the following year. Larger amounts are only considered in exceptional circumstances. Only 1 application should be submitted per organisation.

Town Councillor's Community Grants Fund

Applications should be submitted between August and January each year. Grants awarded are up to £250 per Town Councillor, although a number of Councillors may combine their allocations to create a larger award.

Download a form, save and complete it in Microsoft Word and either email it to us or print it off and post or drop it into the Town Hall. 

We've been able to help individuals from the Biddulph area to access primarily health appointments.

This has been vital in ensuring people can get the help they need, when they need it, especially during such worrying times.

Biddulph Lifeline

Aim: to provide and maintain 22 Automatic External Heart Defibrillators (AED) on public access sites throughout the Biddulph area. Delivered: Ongoing maintenance – involving checking and replacement, where required, of the batteries and defibrillation pads.



Delivered: The grant received assisted 592 unique clients dealing with 1,734 advice issues and dealt with 83 'quick queries' where the client just required a quick signpost to another organization.

Biddulph Local People's Project

Aim: the two main aims of the group are to



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reduce isolation and health and social inequalities of over 50's in Biddulph and increase social capital within the older community.

Delivered: We gave out 45 gift bags to older residents from across Biddulph. Some of the recipients had been shielding because of the pandemic and had limited contact with society, family and friends.



Dementia Friends

The Dementia Friends programme is the biggest ever initiative aiming to change people's perceptions of dementia.



What is a Dementia Friend?

A Dementia Friend is someone who learns about dementia so they can help their community. Many people affected by dementia feel society fails to understand the condition they live with. Dementia Friends help by raising awareness and understanding.

Dementia Friends Champions

In 2018, Sarah & Jodie from Biddulph Town Council volunteered to become Dementia Friends Champions and subsequently ran several information sessions,

creating 256 Dementia Friends in the town.

A Dementia Friends session, designed by the Alzheimer's Society, lasts about an hour, is free to attend and is open to everyone. Sessions can take place within the Town Hall or a group session can be arranged at your workplace/venue.

Dementia Friendly Community

We plan to continue to work towards Biddulph being a Dementia Friendly Community, where people with dementia are understood, respected and supported.

In a Dementia Friendly Community people will be aware of and understand dementia, so that people with dementia can continue to live in the way they want to and in the community they choose.

Dementia Friendly Cinema

We screen a great or classic film - often a musical, with tea and homemade cake served in the interval.

We ensure our screenings are dementia friendly by:

- 1. creating a sociable, relaxed environment
- 2. keeping our lights on low during the film
- 3. providing clear signage
- 4. having a quiet space available
- 5. making sure our staff and volunteers have completed Dementia Friends training

Personal care or supervision is not provided. A friend, family member or carer must also attend.

Although these cinema sessions are particularly designed to be accessible for people with dementia, they are open to the public – everyone is welcome.

Biddulph Valley Way

Opened in 1860, built to transport coal and iron ore to the Potteries and beyond. The last freight train to work through Biddulph ran in 1968. Now part of the national cycle network (route 55), this traffic free trail can be explored on foot, cycle or horseback, a distance of about 10 miles (16 km). The Way has interesting features, such as small copses, hedgerows and ditches which encourage a wild range of wildlife.

Biddulph Moor

At nearly 1,000 ft this village has superb views over Biddulph and the surrounding countryside. Look out for Mow Cop and the Cloud and, on a clear day, Manchester, Jodrell Bank and even the Welsh Mountains. Just out of the village to the south is an unusual and attractive rocky outcrop, Rock End, with views to the southwest.

Greenway Bank Country Park & Knypersley Pool

Located to the south east of the Biddulph Valley, 1 mile from Biddulph Town Centre. Walks around the water and to the head of the River Trent. Open all year round, closes at dusk.

Biddulph Grange Country Park

Originally part of James Bateman's Grange estate, with way marked trails,

fishing and walks. A hydroelectric scheme (reinstated in 2000 provides sustainable power for local use). Some easy paths (with wheelchair and pushchair access), others more difficult including steep climbs. You can fish in the lake, but must buy a fishing day ticket from Biddulph



Town Hall (Monday to Friday) or 'The Hideaway' café (weekends and bank holidays). Day tickets cost £7. The Country Park was purchased by Staffordshire Moorlands District Council (SMDC) in 1988, it remains under their control, with plans to transfer the management of the site to Staffordshire Wildlife Trust. The management of the Visitor Centre was taken

over by Biddulph Town Council in August 2020 and the building refurbished to provide a base for a local business, with 'The Hideaway' café opening in August 2021, drawing visitors to the area, providing both a resource for the community and an attraction for tourists.



Footpaths & Bridleways

Biddulph has over 160 public footpaths. A full list of them all and a link to the County Council's interactive mapping facility are available on Biddulph Town Council's website, together with a checklist should you wish to support a survey of the footpath network to provide an up-to-date picture – to either flag up any issues to the County Council for action (as the highway authority, they are responsible for the maintenance of public rights of way) or for Biddulph Town Council to address, if able to do so.

Biddulph in Bloom

A voluntary unpaid group, with charity status, first set up over 30 years

ago to try and improve the environment of Biddulph and it's surroundings. The group transform our town's public spaces for the better; planting trees and bulbs, creating and restoring hedgerows; caring for an allotment and small nature reserve and creating flowerbeds, containers and borders. They also maintain a fruit orchard within Biddulph



Grange Country Park and paint and varnish nearly 50 memorial seats (given in memory of loved ones), as well as weeding and litter picking across the area.

Biddulph was awarded Gold in the regional and national Britain in Bloom gardening competition in 2019, being the large town category winner and the only entrant achieving Gold in all the three sections of Horticultural



Excellence, Community Participation and Environmental Awareness. There was no Britain in Bloom competition to enter in 2020, due to Covid-19. However, the group continued to maintain the displays; adhering to social distancing and government guidelines and were rewarded with a

Gold award again in 2021.

Station Road Community Garden

When Sainsbury's was developed, Staffordshire Moorlands District Council was given Section 106 monies, to be used to develop a community area/facility. Money was received for the garden area on Station Road, which could only be spent in this area.

Biddulph Town Council worked with a local architect to develop a community garden with seating and planted areas, fountains and a monument to commemorate those that lost their lives during the years when mining was an important part of our town's history. Planning permission was given in 2018 and the building work on phase one completed in 2019-20.

The next stage of the project will include the remaining seating circles and the installation of a mining memorial.



Pocket Parks

Biddulph Town Council was awarded funds from the Ministry of Communities and Local Government to develop a 'Pocket Park' – to transform a neglected area.

The area between Craigside and Dorset Drive was chosen, as this area routinely flooded and despite the efforts of residents, who created drainage channels, there were times in the year when the footpath was impassable.

The area is owned and maintained by Staffordshire Moorlands District Council, who were involved in the delivery of this project. The Town Council matched the funding and managed the day-to-day activities.



The paths and drainage have been improved and a community orchard and wetland willows, bulrushes and other perennials have been planted.
